Final note from District Chairman Chris Wagner

This has been a most productive year for our District. At the district level we have made the transition to understand the new guidelines for Inner Wheel "Open Membership" and we have embraced the new opportunities for growth. We began the year with a "Presidents Forum" where all club presidents joined the District chairman and Zone Rep for an update on the new membership rules and ways to address the concerns of their current members while encouraging and welcoming new members.

In October, we reinstated the tradition of a Friendship Luncheon with District 517. This event was well attended and focused on our IWUSA Foundation with a guest speaker and child recipient from Hanger.

As the IIW President declared 2012-13 to be a 'Renaissance Year', we used our District Board Meetings to help embrace change and open our minds and hearts. We hosted four speaker programs to help update and educate our club delegates and members. The speakers included:

Linda Hall, IWUSA Foundation representative on the 'iGive' program

Rotarian Bill Wittach on ways to achieve membership growth

Barbara Nolan of The Sacramento Crisis Nursery on ideas for selecting and supporting a local charity

Charlie Ansbach, of Ansbach Associates on understanding charitable contributions in a global world.

The district held a fundraiser by involving all inter-club activity groups (Gourmet Club, Book Club, Clay Club and the Pinochle Club) and mentored over 24 AVID students at the fall "Chili Cook-off". By banking our proceeds in the beginning of the year we were able to pledge to fund the printing of 5000 copies of the "Who's Who" book to support District 519 literacy campaign. This printing will support the literacy program for another 3-4 years of anticipated book distribution, a huge goal obtained! By publishing 5000 books our literacy program is now providing books (at our cost) to other USA Clubs to support additional literacy programs across the USA - a growth and sharing effort to be applauded.
